COMMUNITY CAMPAIGN TARGETS ^{\$}500K

Rick Goldring helped bring the long-awaited Joseph Brant Museum expansion project to fruition during his eight-year term as Mayor of Burlington.

Eleanor McMahon, former Tourism Minister and Liberal MPP for Burlington, was instrumental in securing the provincial funding that enabled the project to move forward as a partnership between all three levels of government and the local community.

Both Rick and Eleanor are continuing their personal commitment by joining

the Burlington Museums Foundation Community Campaign to help raise the final \$500,000 toward the community's \$2.5-million commitment for the \$11.4-million project.

"This is a sensational project that will become a lasting legacy for the people of Burlington, one that will encourage and foster greater connectivity with our past," says Rick. "Our waterfront is probably the best on Lake Ontario, and this project is definitely going to enhance its appeal."

Eleanor says she got involved because

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the Joseph Brant Museum expansion will allow the community to "celebrate who we are, and honour the people in our community who have helped make it what it is today."

"It's also an opportunity for economic development through tourism. As former Tourism Minister, I have a unique understanding of how tourism can grow the local economy and this project will have a significant impact."

Rick says this is especially true because the expanded museum will attract worldclass travelling exhibitions that will draw visitors from across the province and beyond.

Eleanor says she is delighted the expanded museum will help preserve and honour our indigenous history. "There is significant archival material that deserves to be seen and protected. Joseph Brant is the founder of Burlington, and many people are not familiar with the significant role of indigenous peoples in our history. The expanded museum will protect these materials in a climate-controlled environment."

John Doyle, Chair of the Burlington Museums Foundation, says he is pleased that the former Mayor and MPP are joining the effort. "Both Rick and Eleanor were big supporters of getting the government funding we needed to get this project off the ground. Both have been promoters of the project for a long time, and we are so pleased they have volunteered to help us bring the campaign to a successful finish.


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NEW DISCOVERY GALLERY BRINGS HANDS-ON FUN FOR KIDS

Cities are made by people! In the Discovery Gallery – Burlington STEAM Zone – children can try being a scientist, a technologist, an explorer, an athlete and a mathematician.
